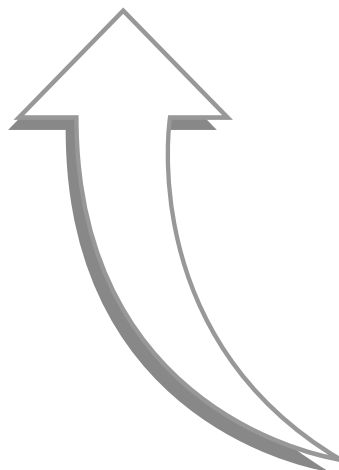

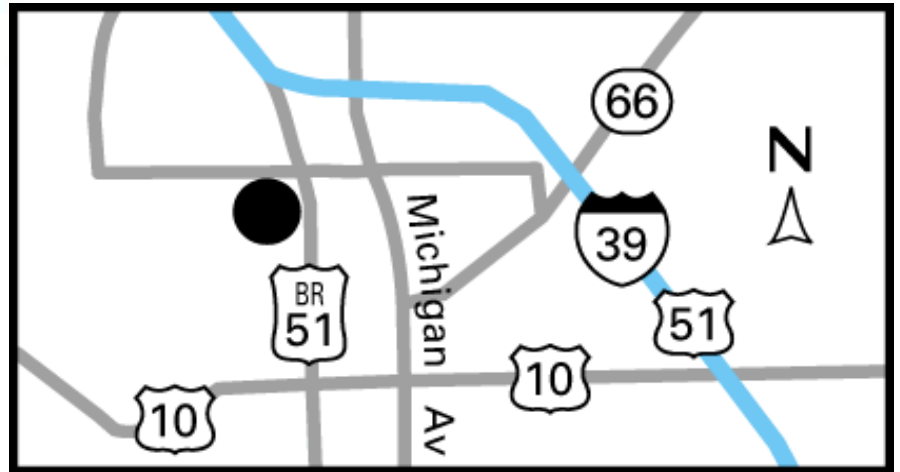

**TITLE: Libraries as Catalysts for Economic
Development**

**SPEAKER: Mary Dempsey, Com-
missioner of the Chicago Public
Library**

DESCRIPTION: Commissioner Dempsey will speak on the Chicago Public Library as an integral part of the city's overall planning and economic development efforts as well as its educational and cultural life. Mayor Richard M. Daley and the Board of Directors of the Chicago Public Library appointed Dempsey to her position as Commissioner in January 1994. Under her leadership, the Chicago Public Library has expanded its public service hours to seven days a week at its three largest locations, constructed or renovated 29 full service branch libraries, upgraded its automated public access catalog, expanded services for children and adults, and launched Internet access and online automated reference services for library patrons and staff. For his efforts in neighborhood library capital improvements under the city's "Neighborhoods Alive" initiative, Mayor Daley received the first annual Library Politician of the Year award from *Library Journal* in 1997.

Her first children's book, *Baby Bat's Lullaby*, is due to be released in the fall of 2003.

SPEAKER: Richard Moore, Investigative Reporter and Columnist, *Lakeland Times*

DESCRIPTION: Investigative reporter and columnist Richard Moore is an advocate for free libraries in what he calls "democracy's common room," a place where young and old, black and white, men and women, rich and poor alike gather freely to learn respect for diversity and for other opinions, for free speech and for democratic institutions.



In the course of their often complicated daily professional lives, Moore believes librarians need to pause and reflect on the many ways in which their work makes a difference to individuals and communities. Their role in keeping society freely and fully informed is often

underestimated these days, but it is more critical than ever as politicians “in the name of national security, in the name of morality and even in the name of the people” take aim at fundamental constitutional rights.

We live in a world in which many have set about to barricade the doors of government, to shut down the free flow of information, says Moore, the lead reporter in a contentious and ongoing open records battle in Oneida County. “The various assaults on our right to know are themselves a form of terrorism, and public libraries may well be Ground Zero in the battle to defeat it.” Moore will talk about this critical role.

Moore’s reporting has focused on poverty, quality child care, government accountability, equitable funding for education and affordable health care. He received the 1997 Media Award from the Wisconsin Early Childhood Association for a series of articles in the *Lakeland Times* on child care trends in Wisconsin and is co-author of *The Reform of State Legislatures* (Univ. Press of America, 1992).
